Plant description	Madhuca indica is a slow-growing speciesand forms a major part of the Indian foresttree belonging to the Sapotaceae family . It isknown by familiar names such as Mahua, andMohwa in North India and Illipi in thesouthern part of India. The tree can shoot upto the height of 8–20 m . The tree grows wellwith annual precipitation ranging from 550 to1500 mm and a temperature of 2–46 °C . Itgrows well on deep loamy and sandy-loamsoil and clayey, calcareous soil and grows upto an altitude of 1200–4500 m. The leavesof Madhuca indica are deep oblong shaped,thick, and firm green in color. The flowersare fleshy, creamy, and clustered at the endsof the branches The circumference of thefruit is ovoid shaped which is 3–5 cm longand consists of 1–4 shiny brown seeds
Distribution	<i>Madhuca indica</i> is a tropical tree found in almost all parts of the Indian subcontinent and the forests of Myanmar, Sri Lanka, and Nepal . <i>Madhuca indica</i> (Mahua) oil is a non-edible oil extracted from the mahua tree. <i>Madhuca indica</i> (latifolia) and <i>Madhuca longifolia</i> (longifolia) are the most available species in India . The tree has huge seed and oil potential of about 500,000 t and 180,000 t, respectively only in India . <i>Madhuca indica</i> is frost-resistant and is grown in dry tropical and subtropical forests at elevations of 1200–1800 m .

Uses	Medicinal Properties Hepatoprotective, Wound healing, Antiburns, Bone healing, Emollient, Skin disease, Rheumatism, Headache, Laxative, Anti- Haemorrhoids, Bronchitis, Anti-ulcer, Astringent, Tonsillitis, Swelling gum, Diabetes, Stomach-ache, Anti snake bite, Increasing milk production in lactating women, Diuretic, Etc
Flowering and fruting time	The flowering season extends from February to April. The copious fall of succulent, corollas weave a cream coloured carpet on the ground. Mahua flower is rich in sugar (73%) and next to cane molasses constitute the most important raw material for alcohol fermentation. The yield of 95% alcohol is 405 liters from one ton of dried flowers. <b>Fruiting</b> : The matured fruits fall on the ground in May and July in the North India and August and September in the South India. The orange brown ripe fleshy berry is 25 to 50 mm long and contains one to four shining seeds. The seeds can be separated from the fruit wall by pressing. Drying and decortications yield 70% kernels on the weight of seeds.
